What are the impacts of litter?

- Environmental impacts Litter can cause harm to wildlife when they mistake it for food or become entangled in it. Stormwater can carry litter into water courses and pollute aquatic ecosystems. Litter in water courses may also end up in the sea where it can harm marine animals. Litter left on land can pollute soil ecosystems and the animals that live in the soil.
- Human health impacts Litter can attract pests and bacteria, increasing the risk of diseases in humans and animals.
- Visual impacts Litter also just looks horrible and can diminish our enjoyment and appreciation of the natural world.

What can we do about litter?

We can also think of the 4Rs, and try to Reduce, Reuse, Repair and Recycle before making waste.

If it is safe to do so, we can also collect litter and place it in the bin so that it doesn't get the chance to pollute our environment. Always get an adult to help with sharp or dirty litter, and always wash your hands after handling litter.

Pieces of soft plastic (like bits of plastic bags) are the most common form of litter found in Australia, with cigarette butts coming in second place.
